Neighborhood Accountability Boards are a community-based, decision-making process aimed at repairing the harm committed by youth against victims and neighborhoods. These programs are based on restorative justice, focusing the attention on what harm was done, and what needs to be done to repair the harm. Accountability Boards are funded by the Department of Juvenile Justice, Lee County Sheriff's Office, and the Lee County Board of County Commissioners.

Volunteers are asked to complete an application, attend the one day training and observe two conferences. A background check is conducted on all potential volunteers. Volunteers are not required to commit to a set amount of hours. Volunteers sit on Boards with youth, the youth's parent/guardian, victim and other volunteers to develop a case plan for the youth.

Board meetings are scheduled in the community where the crime took place. Conference can last up to two hours and are generally held at the library, neighborhood community center, or United Way House. Volunteers are provided a schedule up to two weeks in advance, and carpooling is available.
