Dear Mr. Hunt:

The Boston Red Sox Baseball Club Limited Partnership ("Red Sox") and Lee County ("the County") are parties to a lease agreement dated February 22, 2005 pertaining to City of Palms Stadium located in the State of Florida. The lessee Red Sox has been granted certain exclusive rights for the duration of the lease by the lessor County to use City of Palms Stadium and its appurtenances, including the "Team's Exclusive Use Areas" for the "Team's Exclusive Baseball Activities."

The County has requested that the Red Sox provide its consent to allow the New York Mets organization to use the Leased Premises and equipment owned by the Red Sox for a limited time period which shall commence on September 17, 2011 and terminate on October 29, 2011.

The Red Sox hereby consent to the County's request subject to the County's agreement to the following conditions:

The County, at no cost to the Red Sox, shall promptly cause the repair or replacement of any damaged property, equipment, structures, water apparatus, electric lights, fixtures, appliances, furniture, lockers located on or about the Leased Premises resulting or arising from the New York Mets' use of the Leased Premises, including any property or equipment owned by the Red Sox, subject to ordinary wear and tear.

The County, at no cost to the Red Sox, shall cause the New York Mets to maintain insurance with a company or companies reasonably acceptable to the Red Sox, which company or companies shall have at least an A-Best rating. The minimum requirements of such insurance are:

- a. Workers' compensation insurance in an amount not less than is required by Florid law:
- b. Property damage insurance in an mount no less than \$1,000,000;
- c. Commercial general liability insurance with a limit of \$1,000,000; and

d. The New York Mets shall name the Boston Red Sox Baseball Club, NESV Florida Real Estate and NESV as additional insureds on all comprehensive general liability insurance policies as required herein and shall issue certificates evidencing such insurance policy to the Red Sox no later than September 10, 2010.

The County shall be solely responsible for the cost of all utilities, including but not limited to, electricity costs for any lighting used.

The County, at no cost to the Red Sox, shall be responsible for providing an adequate number and type of stadium personnel e.g. janitorial, security, etc. during the period of time that the New York Mets have use of City of Palms Stadium.

The County shall conduct a joint inspection of the Facility and equipment with representatives of the Red Sox and the New York Mets, prior to the New York Mets leaving City of Palms Park to ascertain whether any property, equipment, etc. is damaged or missing.

The Red Sox reserves all of its rights pursuant to the Lease.

LICENSE BETWEEN LEE COUNTY AND STERLING METS, LP, FOR THE USE OF CITY OF PALMS PARK

The purpose of this License is to state the mutual understandings between **LEE COUNTY**, a political subdivision and charter county of the State of Florida, hereinafter the "County", and **STERLING METS, LP**, hereinafter, "Mets", collectively, the "Parties", regarding the use of the City of Palms Park.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the County owns and operates athletic facilities known as the City of Palms Park, hereinafter, "Facilities", and Sterling Mets, LP, is desirous of using a portion of the Facilities for their Fall Instructional Leagues; and,

WHEREAS, the County entered into that certain Lease Agreement dated
February 25, 2004, by and between the Boston Red Sox Baseball Club, and Lee
County, and that certain Lease Agreement dated February 22, 2005, amending same;
and,

WHEREAS, the County and Mets are mutually desirous of entering into a License Agreement regarding the Facilities.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the above and the mutual obligations as set forth further herein, the Parties hereby agree as follows:

 The Mets, will use a portion of the City of Palms Park for their Fall Instructional League.

- 2. The Boston Red Sox has an existing lease of the City of Palms Park and has agreed to allow the Sterling Mets, LP to use designated areas of the City of Palms Park to include both playing fields, the Major League Clubhouse, medical training rooms and equipment, washer/dryer facility, various clubhouse offices and workout areas.
- 3. Based on the Boston Red Sox agreeing to allow the County to license certain designated areas of the City of Palms Park pursuant to the term and conditions of this License, the County will license to the Mets certain designated areas of the City of Palms Park to include both playing fields, the Major League Clubhouse, medical training rooms and equipment, washer/dryer facility, various clubhouse offices and workout areas (collectively, the "Licensed Premises").
- 4. The Mets will use certain designated areas of the City of Palms Park for their Fall Instructional League for the term of September 14, 2011, up to and including October 10, 2011.
- Mets will pay to Lee County TWELVE THOUSAND and 00/100 DOLLARS
 (\$12,000.00) for use of the Licensed Premises, no later than October 5,
 2011.
- 6. Mets may not assign its rights hereunder, without the prior written consent of the County and the Boston Red Sox. Failure to comply with this section may result in immediate termination of the Agreement.
- 7. Mets shall at all times hereafter indemnify, hold harmless and, at the County Attorney's option, defend or pay for any attorney selected by the

County Attorney to defend Lee County, its officers, agents, servants, and employees from and against any and all causes of action, demands, claims, losses, liabilities and expenditures of any kind, including without limitation injuries or damage to persons and property (including reasonable outside attorney fees, court costs, and expenses) (collectively, "Losses"), to the extent that such Losses are caused by intentional or negligent act of, or omission of Mets, its employees, agents, servants, or officers.

- 8. The Mets, at no cost to the County, shall promptly cause the repair or replacement of any damaged property, equipment, structures, water apparatus, electric lights, fixtures, appliances, furniture, lockers located on or about the Licensed Premises resulting or arising from the New York Mets' use of the Licensed Premises subject to ordinary wear and tear.
- 9. The Mets, at no cost to the County, shall maintain insurance with a company or companies reasonably acceptable to the County, which company or companies shall have at least an A-Best rating. The minimum requirements of such insurance are:
 - a. Workers' compensation insurance in an amount not less than is required by applicable law;
 - b. Property damage insurance in an amount no less than \$1,000,000;
 - c. Commercial general liability insurance with a limit of \$1,000,000;
 - Mets shall provide insurance and name Lee County and the Boston
 Red Sox Baseball Club, NESV Florida Real Estate and NESV as

additional inured on all comprehensive general liability insurance policies as required herein and shall issue certificates evidencing such insurance policy to the County no later than September 14, 2011.

This License and all Mets obligations hereunder are subject to the Major League Rules and the Professional Baseball Agreement, to the extent such Major League Rules and the Professional Baseball Agreement are applicable.

Page 1 of 7

- 1. The Recitals as set forth above are incorporated into the terms of this Agreement as if set out herein at length.
- 2. The County and the Association agree to enter into this Agreement concerning installation and maintenance of landscape improvements within said County right-of-way.
- 3. Reference to the Association includes all assigns and successors in interest.
- 4. The Association agrees to landscape the right-of-way of Bonita Beach Road including the installation of plant materials and irrigation system within the right-of-way in accordance with plans and specifications approved by Association and Lee County Department of Transportation, hereinafter referred to DOT (see attached plans marked Exhibit "A", and by reference, made a part hereof). All costs for construction, initial landscaping and maintenance of the landscape improvements as described on Exhibits "A" shall be at the Association's expense.
- 5. The Association will install and maintain the landscape improvements in an acceptable manner to DOT. DOT reserves the right to reject any plant material for sub-standard quality, improper planting/pruning or maintenance practices, and unsound tree structure. Trees shall be pruned in a manner that will provide a structurally sound street tree, in order to minimize storm damage and tree/branch failure. Should the Association fail to provide such care; the County will do so with its resources, and pursue reimbursement compensation from the Association for all expenses incurred.
- 6. The Association agrees to maintain the landscape improvements and all other items incidental to the landscaping, including all plant materials and hard scape items, during the installation and on-going maintenance of the landscape improvements.
- 7. The Association agrees to prevent obstructions or conditions which may be dangerous to the public through the exercise of its rights of the performance of its installation and maintenance duties. This includes providing clear visibility for motorists and pedestrians and the avoidance of wetting the adjacent roadway or bike paths/sidewalks.

- 8. The Association agrees to indemnify, hold harmless and defend the County and all of its officers, agents, consultants and employees from and against all losses, claims, demands, payments, suits, actions, recoveries, and judgments of every nature and description brought or recoverable against it or them by reason of any act or omission of the Association, its agents, consultants, employees, or subcontractors, during the installation of landscape improvements or their maintenance contemplated by this Agreement; and also agrees to assume any related costs or fees. Association further agrees to carry and maintain in full force and effect liability insurance so as to indemnify the County in all respects. A copy of the Certificate of Insurance provided by the Association is attached as Exhibit "B". This insurance must remain in effect until such time as any assign or successor in interest provides similar proof of insurance to the satisfaction of the County Attorney's Office.
- 9. The Association assumes all risk and bears any loss or injury to property or persons occasioned by neglect or accident arising from the exercise of its rights or the performance of its maintenance duties.
- 10. The Association also assumes full responsibility for loss by reason of neglect or violation of any state or federal law or local government rule, regulation or order. The Association will give all required notices relating to the landscaping or maintenance contemplated by this Agreement to the proper authorities. In addition, Association will obtain all official permits and licenses, and pay all proper fees.
- 11. The Association agrees to repair, restore, or rebuild any damage caused to County property by installing or maintaining the landscape improvements in the described right-of-way.
- 12. Failure to maintain the landscape improvements as stated above, or keep the certificate of insurance current, shall constitute a default on the part of the Association. Failure of the Association to maintain the landscape improvements, or keep the certificate of insurance up to date will result in the County removing the landscape improvements and invoicing the Association for the removal and restoration costs. Association agrees to pay the County all of the County's costs for the removal of the landscape improvements and restoration of the areas to pre-construction conditions.

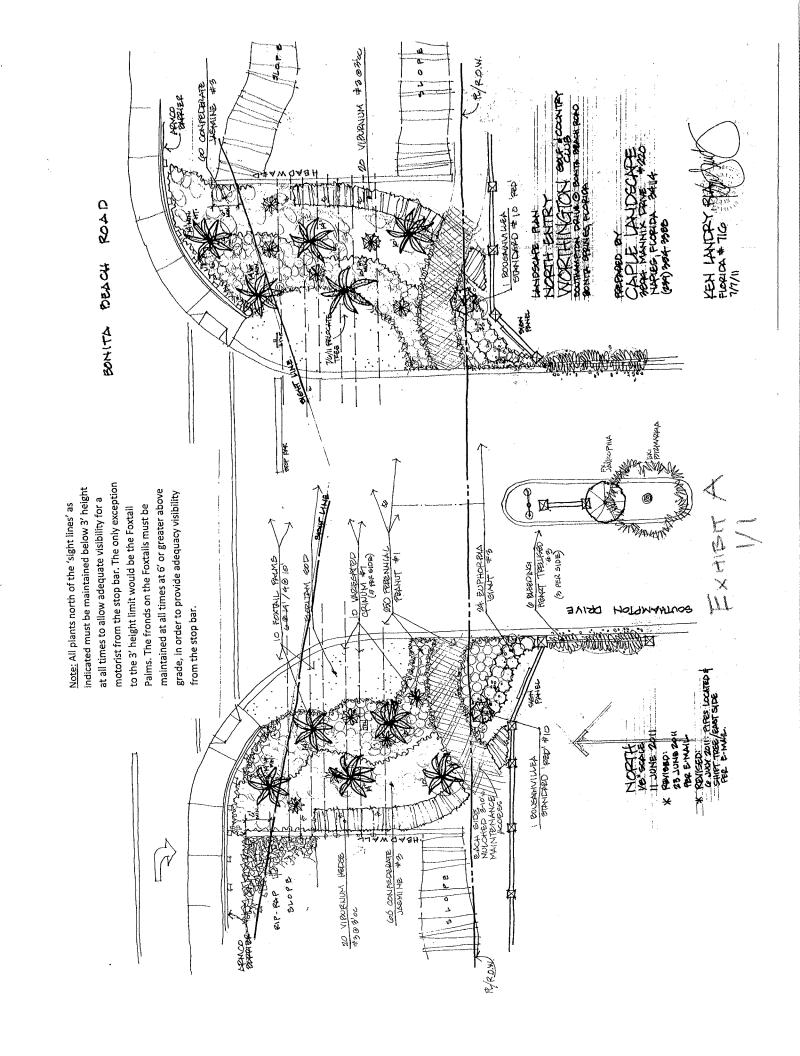
- 13. Failure of the Association to pay the County the invoiced removal and restoration costs owed under this Agreement within thirty (30) days following receipt of the invoice shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement by the Association.
- 14. This Agreement will continue in full force and effect until such time as the road is widened, repaired, closed, abandoned, vacated, discontinued, reconstructed, or until the Association receives written notice of the County's termination of this Agreement, or until such time as Association notifies the County in writing of the intent to terminate this Agreement. At the County's option, the Association may be required to remove or relocate all of the landscape improvements placed within the right-ofway by virtue of this Agreement, and restore those areas to preconstruction conditions within thirty (30) days of the Association's receipt of written notice. The cost of relocation or removal of the landscape improvements and restoration of those areas to pre-construction conditions will be paid entirely by the Association.
- 15. The Association agrees that if the placement, repair, relocation or reconstruction of public utilities, including but not limited to water, sewage, gas, power, telephone located within the right-of-way, requires the relocation or removal of the landscape improvements referenced herein, then the Association will move or remove the landscape improvements and restore those areas to pre-construction conditions within thirty (30) days of the Association's receipt of written notice at no cost to the County or utility.
- 16. This Agreement binds and inures to the benefit of the parties as well as their respective legal representatives, successors and/or assigns. In the event Association assigns its obligations hereunder to successor Owners, Association, or Homeowner's Association, all of Association's obligations and agreements made herein shall be fully and completely assigned to such assignee in full as if such assignee were mentioned by name instead of Association herein. In the event the Association desires to transfer its rights and obligations hereunder to a third party such as a homeowner's association, County agrees to cooperate with respect to modifying this Agreement in accordance with Section 19 below provided that prior to such assignment being binding on County, Association will demonstrate to County that the association to become the assignee has the authority to undertake the obligations and responsibilities herein contemplated.

- 17. The Association may assign the rights and obligations set forth herein to successor Owners, Association, or Homeowner Associations, except that Association will remain responsible under the terms of this Agreement until such time as the Association or successor in interest can provide written documentation to the satisfaction of the County Attorney's Office, which confirms that its success in interest has assumed responsibility for the compliance with the terms and conditions of this Agreement with respect to the landscape improvements.
- 18. This Agreement must be construed, and its performance enforced under Florida law.
- 19. This Agreement is the entire agreement between the parties and shall not be modified or replaced except by another signed written Agreement.
- 20. The Parties recognize and agree that this Agreement is of a unique nature inuring principally to the benefit of the Association and that money damages may not be an adequate or appropriate remedy for either Party for breach of the terms herein. As a result, the Parties specifically agree that a non-defaulting Party may raise in any pleadings, without objections from the alleged defaulting Party, the extraordinary remedy of specific performance, in order to protect the public's interest in this Agreement.

This proposal is based upon a scope of work including the re-roof of the main six story roof and penthouse of the Lee County Administration Building on Second Street, as well as the reroofing of the lower roof areas adjacent to the structure and the generator room as indicated on the Atlas Structural Engineering, LLC plans titled *Re-Roof County Administration Building* issued 7/1/11.

The work is to be performed using a Fibertite roof system as specified (including tapered insulation, cap sheet, flashings) and the work is to be performed by a roofer certified by Fibertite to install the product. Background: The Parks and Recreation Ordinance was recently amended by Lee County Ordinance No. 10-41, in an effort to settle litigation against the County regarding a violation of the concealed weapons regulations set forth in Section 790.06, Florida Statutes. Subsequent to adoption of this ordinance the Legislature adopted House Bill 45 amending Section 790.33, Florida Statutes. For the reasons outlined below, staff is proposing to amend the provisions pertaining to weapons to eliminate all references to firearms and clarify that the "weapons" controlled by the ordinance do not include firearms or ammunition. In conjunction with this amendment, County staff is actively changing all signs located on County park property and Conservation 20/20 lands to eliminate text and symbols that may constitute a violation of Section 790.33, Florida Statutes. The stated purpose of House Bill 45 is to strengthen the statutory preemption regarding state regulation of firearms and to remove any local discretion with respect to the regulation of firearms. To this end the preemption provision was amended to read as follows:

Except as expressly provided by the State Constitution or general law, the Legislature hereby declares that it is occupying the whole field of regulation of firearms and ammunition including the purchase, sale, transfer, taxation, manufacture, ownership, possession, storage, and transportation thereof, to the exclusion of all existing and future county, city, town, or municipal ordinances or any administrative regulations or rules adopted by local or state government relating thereto. Any such existing ordinance, rules, or regulations are hereby declared null and void.

In addition to the refining the preemption, the Legislature clarified the intent of the new provisions as follows:

It is further the intent of this section to deter and prevent the violation of this section and the violation of rights protected under the constitution and laws of this state related to firearms, ammunition, or components thereof, by the abuse of official authority that occurs when enactments are passed in violation of state law or under color of local or state authority.

The Legislature also established civil and criminal penalties to be imposed against any person, county, agency, municipality or district for knowingly or willfully violating the preemption. [Civil penalties: a personal fine of up to \$5,000.00 and specifically disallowing use of public funds to defend or pay the fine and/or termination of employee or removal from office; Criminal penalty: third-degree felony]

Based upon the above, and the balance of House Bill 45, staff conducted a review of the County regulations pertaining to firearms, ammunition and related components in order to determine whether amendment of the regulations were necessary to avoid potential violation of the statutory preemption. In accord with this review, County staff recommends adoption of the amendments as proposed.

LEE COUNTY ORDINANCE NO.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING LEE COUNTY ORDINANCE NO. 06-26, KNOWN AS THE LEE COUNTY PARKS AND RECREATION ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 6.1 PERTAINING TO WEAPONS; PROVIDING FOR EFFECT OF RECITALS, CONFLICTS, INCLUSION IN THE CODE, SEVERABILITY AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the recreational use of the public parks is a treasured asset of this County that is afforded to the public at large, including residents of and visitors to the County; and

WHEREAS, it is in the interest of the public health, safety and welfare that certain controls and regulations be placed on persons using public park resources in order to ensure maximum enjoyment of the resources by the general public, while affording protection and preservation of natural and manmade resources, and reducing the risk of injury to park patrons; and

WHEREAS, as part of House Bill 45, adopted in 2011, the Florida Legislature amended Florida Statutes §790.33 to strengthen the provisions preempting any and all regulation of firearms to the state and established penalties for enacting or enforcing regulations pertaining to firearms, ammunition or components thereof, even if enacted in good faith or under color of law; and

WHEREAS, the Board finds amending the provisions of Lee County Ordinance No. 06-26, as amended, to eliminate any potential violation of Florida Statutes Chapter 790, is prudent and appropriate.

NOW THEREFORE, be it ordained by the Board of County Commissioners of Lee County, Florida, that an amendment to Lee County Ordinance No. 06-26 is hereby adopted as follows:

SECTION ONE: EFFECT OF RECITALS

The above recitals are incorporated by reference into the body of this ordinance and adopted as Findings of Fact.

SECTION TWO: AMENDMENT OF SECTION 6.1

Lee County Parks and Recreation Ordinance No. 06-26, Section 6.1 pertaining to weapons is hereby by amended as follows, with deleted text identified by strike-through and additional text identified by underlining.

6.1 WEAPONS

- (A) Florida Statutes §790.33(3)(a) requires the County to enforce State firearms laws. Consistent with Florida Statutes, the use or possession of weapons or firearms while on County park properties is prohibited, except in compliance with F.S. Ch. 790. Any person carrying a concealed weapon or firearm in a County park must possess on their person a valid Florida Concealed Weapon or Firearm License issued by the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services and valid identification, or otherwise be exempt from the provisions of F.S. Ch. 790.
- (A) Consistent with Florida Statutes §790.01(14), the term "weapon" as used in this section specifically excludes firearms and ammunition.
- (B) The use or possession of certain weapons on county park property may be permitted for specific activities requiring the use of particular weapons as or other specialized equipment to engage in the permitted activity or special event affirmatively authorized by law enforcement officials or the Parks and Recreation Director.
- (C) The use or possession of BB guns, air rifles, air guns and paint guns are prohibited on County park property.
 - (D) Penalties. Consistent with F.S. Ch. 790:
 - (1) A person upon park property carrying a concealed weapon or firearm without also carrying both the license issued under F.S. §790.06 and proper identification commits a non-criminal violation subject to a civil penalty of \$25.00.
 - (2) A person upon park property carrying a concealed weapon or electronic weapon/device on or about his/her person without a proper permit issued under F.S. §790.06 commits a first degree misdemeanor punishable as provided in F.S. §§775.082 or 775.083.

The Legislature also established civil and criminal penalties to be imposed against any person, county, agency, municipality or district for knowingly or willfully violating the preemption. (Civil penalties: a personal fine of up to \$5,000.00 and specifically disallowing use of public funds to defend or pay the fine and/or termination of employee or removal from office; Criminal penalty: third-degree felony)

Based upon the above, and the balance of House Bill 45, staff conducted a review of the county regulations pertaining to firearms, ammunition and related components in order to determine whether amendment of the regulations were necessary to avoid potential violation of the statutory preemption. In accord with this review, County staff recommends adoption of the amendment as proposed.

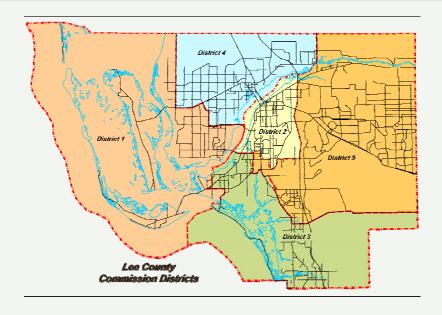

2011 Lee County Commission Redistricting

Introduction

The county commission redistricting process is mandated by Florida State Statutes, Chapter 124.01 (3), which stipulates that "The board of county commission shall from time to time, fix the boundaries [commission district boundaries] so as to keep them as nearly equal in proportion to population as possible…" The statutes provide for these changes to be made only in odd-numbered years.

This report presents five alternatives for the 2011 redistricting of the commissioner districts. The district boundaries were last updated in 2001 using the population figures obtained from the 2000 Census. In the same manner, the 2010 U.S. Census population information has been used to redraw the Lee County commissioner districts. The 2010 U.S. Census population figures show considerable population growth in certain areas of the county. This growth has not occurred evenly throughout each commission district causing an imbalance in population figures between districts. The alternatives presented here are just five possible ways in which the current district boundaries can be redrawn. Other redistricting proposals can be put forth or modifications can be made to any of the five alternatives. Each of the alternatives presented in this report meet or exceed the standards for redistricting that have been set forth by case law precedents for equal population.

Lee County Population Change

The U.S. Census Bureau population counts for the 2010 Census signify a 40.3 percent increase in the Lee County population since the 2000 Census. The increase in population did not, however, occur evenly across the county or across the five existing County Commission Districts. All 5 of the districts reported an increase in population. District 5, which includes Lehigh Acres, Gateway, and the area surrounding Florida Gulf Coast University, had the largest population increase (95.77%) while District 2 had the lowest (6.68%) increase between the two Census reports.

Before redrawing the new district boundaries, a comparison of the 2010 U.S. Census population was made to that of the 2000 U.S. Census population figures. The 2001 district boundaries were utilized for this comparison and the population distribution is presented in Table 1 below. The targets for district populations in 2000 and 2010 equal the total census population of that year divided by the number of districts.

The Redistricting Process

The redistricting process involves redrawing the Lee County commissioner district boundary lines in such a manner that all five districts achieve a population close to the target population figure of 123,751 persons. Additionally, a number of criteria are used as guidelines while redrawing the boundary lines to produce new commission districts. The equal population objective is statutorily mandated while the other criteria are drawn from case law precedents or common redistricting practices. Given the growth patterns since the last Census, each alternative addresses the need to allocate considerable population from district 5, which received 47% of the county population increase, to districts 1 and 2, which collectively received only 15% of the county population increase. Districts 3 and 4 grew the closest to the county average with both receiving nearly 20% of the county population increase. The attached maps depict 5 Alternative redistricting approaches created by staff.

Each of the five alternatives was devised to adhere to the following redistricting practices as closely as possible. As such, all of the alternatives can be considered to have:

- an equal population distribution,
- compact boundaries,
- alignment with Census geography,
- boundaries that follow prominent physical features,
- limited splitting of established neighborhoods,
- similar boundaries to existing districts,
- avoided packing and diluting minority population, and
- considered population growth for future population equity.

These criteria are discussed in greater detail in the following sections. Additionally, the Lee County School Board stated its desire to adopt the same alternative used by the County Commission Districts as the School Board Districts.

Equal Population Distribution – The primary goal of redistricting every 10 years in is to establish commission districts that are "as nearly equal in proportion to population as possible.." (F.S. 124.01 [3]). For state level redistricting, case law precedent generally requires that district populations do not vary by more than 2.5 percent of the target population - that is 2.5 percent more or less than the target population. This measure is calculated by taking the difference between the actual population of each district and the target population and dividing the difference by the target population. Therefore, the range for acceptable commission district populations is between 120,657 and 126,845. Table 2 shows that all five of the alternatives proposed by staff adhere to this criterion. It also shows that the current districts do not meet the equal population distribution criteria, and therefore must be amended.

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Several other methods exist for measuring equal population. In addition to the relative range figure, a simple calculation of the overall range can also be used. This figure is calculated by subtracting the district with the smallest population from the district with the largest population. The results of these calculations are shown in table 3. Using the 2.5% variation criteria, the greatest acceptable overall range between the high and low population is 6,188. However, neither the high nor the low commission district population should vary more than 3,094 persons from the target population. While alternative 3 does have the smallest population difference between districts, all of the alternatives are within an acceptable range.

Another measure that is used in redistricting is known as the percent relative mean deviation. This measure is calculated by adding up the absolute deviations of each district (how far off each district is from the target population) and dividing that number by the number of districts, in this case five. This value is then divided by the target population figure. The percent relative mean deviation is a more stable form of measurement because in the case of range calculations, a large value can be obtained because of substantial deviations between just two districts, thus providing a deceptive notion of the results at first glance. Table 4 contains the deviation of each commission district population from the target population for each alternative. The percent relative mean of each the alternatives are within the accepted standards.

Compactness – A compact district minimizes the perimeter of the district relative to the size of the district. Compactness is an important criterion since absence of this factor, or districts with meandering or serpentine boundaries, may be interpreted as a gerrymandered redistricting solution and thus may be subject to legal challenge.

Compact districts limit the potential for gerrymandering, whether for political advantage, racial and ethnic considerations or to achieve other objectives. Political factors are not considered in this redistricting effort; all alternatives are developed without regard to political party affiliation, or the location or concentration of any political group.

An analytical measure of compactness is used in this report to describe each district's compactness in each alternative. The most common measure of the "compactness" ²of the polygon representing the district compares the enclosed area of the shape to the area that would be enclosed by a circle with the same perimeter (circumference). A circle is used for this calculation since it is the most compact geometric shape possible. The results of this test would be a number greater than 0 and less than 1. A compactness figure of 1 would be the result of a district that was a circle. There are no established standards of compactness, but the figures are useful in evaluating compactness of the various districts between the alternatives. The measure of compactness for the five alternatives and the existing districts are shown in Table 5.

Alignment of District Boundaries with Census Geography – In order to accurately record the population in each district, it is important that the district boundaries follow Census geography. Without this, it would be much more difficult to determine the population distribution or use any of the census information in analyzing each district. Census geography serves as important spatial units for statistical purposes, as well as a separator of prominent physical features. All of the Commission District alternatives follow Census geography at the Census Block level to create districts with as equal a distribution of population as feasible.

Alignment with Prominent Physical Features – In dividing the districts, prominent features such as the Caloosahatchee River, Interstate 75, US 41, and other major roads were used. This criterion serves multiple purposes. First, aligning commission district boundaries along major physical features reinforces the criterion of retaining established neighborhoods since, as noted, these areas are often delineated using prominent features. Second, this criterion allows commission districts to be more easily described and conceptualized. Finally, prominent features are frequently used by the Census Bureau and the Supervisor of Elections in designating census tract lines and voting precinct lines and in drawing other statistical boundary areas.

When possible, each of the five alternative's district boundaries mirrors prominent physical features. District boundaries do deviate from these features in each of the alternatives in order to adhere to other redistricting practices, primarily equal population and following Census tract lines. In each alternative, as in the past, there are districts that span the Caloosahatchee River to equalize the population within the

commission districts. Currently, over 62% of the residents of Lee County live "south" of the river while approximately 34% live "north" of the river and the remaining 4% live on the islands.

Retention of Established Neighborhoods and Communities – Whenever possible, the redrawing of the commissioner boundaries was done so that established communities and neighborhoods were kept intact and not split between districts. This helps to ensure that communities with a common set of issues or needs are able to unite under single district leadership. The City of Fort Myers is currently split between districts 2 and 5. Two of the alternatives include Fort Myers within a single district. The City of Cape Coral has a total population larger than the target district population it must be split into multiple districts in all 5 of the proposed alternatives. Three of the alternatives keep the City of Bonita Springs within a single district and two alternatives split the city between districts 3 and 5. All of the alternatives keep the City of Sanibel and the Town of Fort Myers Beach within a single district.

Retaining Existing District Boundary Lines – In each of the five alternatives, the redistricting was done so that each Commissioner resided in their assigned district. This was an important criterion because it facilitates better communication and understanding of what is going on in each commissioner's own district. Because drastic changes in district boundaries can lead to disruption of representative government and the orderly and expeditious provision of governmental services, it was important to align the new district boundaries so they would be closely related to the old boundaries. Alternatives 1 and 2 most closely match the existing district boundaries. Alternative 3 deviates most from the existing district boundaries. The attached maps include a dashed line representing the existing commission districts. Furthermore, each alternative was drawn to include the school board member currently residing in each district.

Long Term Population Equity – This criterion is identified in an attempt to avoid the substantial inequities in district populations that may arise in coming years. An attempt was made to include areas targeted for future development within all districts in each alternative. This criterion must however be balanced against the statutory requirement of equal population, a requirement that essentially provides a "snapshot" view of the current population distribution and the measure of compactness.

Avoidance of Minority "Dilution" or "Packing" - This criterion is of great importance in the redrawing of district boundary lines. The concerns surrounding this issue have received a great deal of legal scrutiny, especially when the issues are related to the provisions of the 1965 Voting Rights Act and the subsequent amendments.

Minority dilution means the intentional redrawing of lines so that minority populations are divided into two or more districts, thereby diluting minority-voting strength. Minority packing on the other hand entails the redrawing of district boundary lines to include a greater number of minorities into what are already "safe" minority districts, thus effectively relegating minority representation to a limited number of districts. As defined by case law precedent, a "safe" minority district is one in which a minority group that is "geographically compact" and "politically cohesive" constitutes 60 to 65 percent of the total population of that district. In this instance, a minority group may be composed of more than one racial or ethnic minority, provided they meet the cohesive and compactness tests noted earlier.

Lee County has a relatively low minority population. Of the 618,754 total population count in the 2010 Census count, 105,258 are listed as minority (non-white). Of the 113,308 persons of Hispanic or Latino origin, 74,448 are listed as white. Adding the white Hispanic population to the minority population yields a minority/ethnic population of 179,706 persons in Lee County. This represents 29.04 percent of the total county population. Table 6 shows the distribution of the minority and Hispanic/Latino population in each of the alternatives and the current commission districts. In all of these instances, district 2 contains the highest concentration of non-white and/or Hispanic population. Given the compactness of the districts, it is clear that neither "packing" nor "dilution" of this population segment has occurred in any of the alternatives.

Summary

In summary, Planning Staff believes that all of the alternatives presented meet or exceed all of the statutory and case law precedents or common redistricting practices. Staff recommends Alternative 1 as best meeting the established redistricting criteria. However, any of the alternatives meet these criteria and may be selected as presented or with minor modifications. Significant changes to the alternatives may require additional staff evaluation for compliance with the statutes and case law precedents.
