*All registration fees have been waived for the 2024 Livestock Show. Those previously registered for the 2024 Southwest Florida & Lee County Fair must re-register by new deadline.

REGISTRATION GUIDELINES



- 1. Exhibitors must be bona fide members of 4-H / FFA program and must reside in Lee, Charlotte, Collier, DeSoto, Glades or Hendry County and must be a minimum of eight (8) years old as of September 1, 2023. *PeeWee/Cloverbud participants may be 5-7 years old. PeeWees are permitted to show in the Small Animal and Goat division. Cloverbud participants may show in the Small Animal division only.
- 2. Following the first weigh-in, all animals must reside in Lee, Charlotte, Collier, DeSoto, Glades or Hendry County.
- 3. Livestock Exhibitors must be 18 years old or younger and still be in grade or high school. Market entries are limited to one market animal per exhibitor. All Exhibitors will be categorized by the following ages and awards/premiums will be given according to these divisions:
 - PeeWee / Cloverbud (Ages 5-7) see animal/division restrictions listed above
 - Junior (ages 8-10)
 - Intermediate (ages 11-13)
 - Senior (ages 14-18)
- 4. Exhibitors are expected to be accompanied by their parent/guardian at all mandatory meetings and weighins. Any requests for attendance exemptions must receive prior written approval. Requests can be submitted in advance to Livestock@leegov.com.
- 5. All animals (except small animals) must have a signed health certificate by an accredited veterinarian dated no more than 90 days prior to the Show. Horses must have a current Coggins certificate dated within one (1) year prior to the Show, and a health certificate dated within 10 days of entering the show. Animal tag number should be verified to match the health certificate. All market animals are considered interstate commerce; therefore, they are required to be officially identified per state by either a National Uniform Ear-tagging System or Animal Identification Number. All tags are the responsibility of the Exhibitor. *This rule is subject to further change according to Florida Administrative Code 5C.4, as amended.
- 6. Danish System will be used by all judges. Judge decisions are final; Exhibitors and parents/guardians are prohibited from speaking to the judges during the shows.
- 7. Exhibitors are responsible for preparing hand-written or typed buyer's and add-on invitations no later than two (2) weeks before the Livestock Show.
- 8. All Exhibitors, ages 8 to 18, are required to complete the Ethics Training to show an animal. When registering for the Livestock Show, the Ethics Training ID should be entered. If this training has not been completed at the time of registration, the Ethics Numbers can be submitted via email to Livestock@leegov.com prior to Friday, February 9, 2024. Failure to fulfill this requirement will result in disqualification of the animal registered.
- 9. All livestock Exhibitors, regardless of age, must have a Premise ID with their registration in order to show.

WEIGH-INS, CHECK-INS & TAGGING



Weigh-Ins / Check-Ins

Exhibitors and their parent/guardian must be able to unload and load their animal at the first weigh-in or tagging. Assistance is provided by request only. Lee County Parks & Recreation, its staff and its volunteers are not responsible for any injury to animals when assistance is provided. All animals needing to be weighed-in will be weighed on certified scales. Only the Exhibitor and their animal are allowed in the weigh-in area during weighins.

At first weigh-in / tagging, Exhibitors must bring the following documentation:

- Owner's Certificate (with RFID and Premise ID listed)
- Three (3) buyer's letters (in individually addressed envelopes, complete with proper postage)
- Code of Conduct forms

Pictures will be taken to show proof of animal that is tagged in.

Final Weigh-Ins

All animal entries must meet health requirements of the Florida Department of Agriculture pertaining to the animal that is exhibited. Any animals showing signs of illness, hernia, warts, communicable diseases, ringworms, etc. must be approved by an accredited veterinarian before weighing in; or as required by the Florida Department of Agriculture.

BARN EXHIBITOR EXPECTATIONS



Barn Rules

Specific barn rules will be posted in each barn. It is the responsibility of the Exhibitor to check the barn daily for any changes in the rules or other announcements.

Pens and Stalls

Exhibitors are required to feed and clean pens/stalls daily for each animal they are exhibiting. Exhibitors are the only individuals permitted to clean/feed their exhibit animals. Any exception must receive prior approval by the respective Barn Lead. Parents/guardians are not permitted to assist. Exhibitors are not to be in the barn except during the approved hours before the fair. All exhibitors must sign in and out with a Barn Lead.

Cleaning

■ Exhibitors must provide their own cleaning supplies. All equipment should be labeled with the Exhibitor's name and must be kept in show boxes when not in use. Parents/guardians must provide supervision while Exhibitors are on the grounds. All animals must be kept in stalls once fairgrounds open to the public.

Feeding

Feeding times will vary based on barn and will be posted by Barn Leads. Evening feedings must be completed by 6 p.m. as barns are open to the public at that time. Exhibitors must feed once a day on weekdays and twice a day on weekends.

Grooming

Exhibitors are required to groom their own animals, however they may enlist the 'hands-on help' of another Exhibitor (help from parents/guardians is not permitted). Professional groomers are not allowed in the make-up area. Shaving, dyeing or defacing animals in any way will result in disqualification of the Exhibitor and their animal will be removed from the show, deeming it ineligible for sale.

Please note: If an Exhibitor and an animal exhibit are removed for neglect, ALL animals belonging to the Exhibitor on grounds must also be removed. The Exhibitor will also be disqualified to show for the current year and the following year.

Workdays

 Exhibitor workdays (such as clean-up days) are mandatory and will be scheduled by each Barn Lead. Exhibitors that do not attend the Barn Clean Up day will not be allowed to show the following year. Barn Leads are responsible for being present and beginning the work day.

Show and Sales Attendance

Exhibitors are expected to remain in the Livestock Pavilion until their show and/or sale, including resale, are complete. Failure to do so may result in loss of all premium monies. Parents/guardians of Exhibitors are not to be in the pens or closed barn areas during shows and sales. The Livestock Advisory Committee will designate personnel for specific show dates and times to assist in these areas. Anyone without prior approval will be asked to leave immediately.

BARN EXHIBITOR EXPECTATIONS



Animal Tampering

Use of tranquilizers or other forms of tampering are prohibited. Lee County Parks & Recreation reserves the right to test an animal at any time. Nothing may be given to animals except feed, hay and water while on the grounds. Under no circumstances may anyone give anything to calm an animal. No drugs may be administered to the animals while on the grounds unless being administer by a state-certified veterinarian with approval from LCPR staff. No chemicals are to be administered within 30 days of the show unless administered by a certified veterinarian and accompanied by a letter from the vet.

Safe Handling / Control of Animal

All animals must be handled / managed safely by the Exhibitor. Repeated loss of control of the animal will result in removal from the show and the grounds at the discretion of Lee County Parks & Recreation staff. Bovine must be double tied with halter and neck ropes.

Service Animals

Aside from the animals in a show, service animals are the only animals allowed in the barn(s). Absolutely no pets are allowed.

Dress Code

Exhibitors are required wear dark black or dark blue pants/jeans with a long-sleeved, buttoned dress shirt and closed-toed shoes or boots during all shows and sales. Only official 4-H or FFA jackets are permitted. Hats/caps will not be permitted to be worn during any show or sale. Exhibitors are expected to wear proper attire in all barn areas during feeding and cleaning/grooming (no crocs permitted).

Exhibit Signs

An Exhibit Sign containing the Exhibitor's name, Club affiliation, animal weight and breed must be displayed on the pen or stall by 5 p.m. on the day of animal check-in. Signs should be $8 \frac{1}{2}$ " x 11" (may not exceed 21" x 21") and must be approved by the respective Barn Leads.

Ask Me Booths

The 'Ask Me Booth' is designed to provide an opportunity for the public to meet and speak with youth about their Livestock Project. Participation in the 'Ask Me Booth' is not required but is encouraged; participation may provide additional competition points in various barns. Exhibitors will be evaluated on their participation and interaction with the public and are required to wear 4-H or FFA attire (includes club shirts).

Program Book Ad Sales (Encouraged for all Steer and Swine Exhibitors)

For the 2024 Livestock Show, Exhibitors are encouraged to sell a minimum of \$80 worth of ads for the Program Book. Premiums will be awarded for the highest amount of ads sold and the highest dollar amount of ads sold. Program Ad Forms will be available starting Tuesday, November 14, 2023 and are due by Friday, December 15, 2023.

Premiums and Sale Payouts

All sale proceeds and other premiums will be mailed to Exhibitors following the closeout of the fair.

Lee County Parks & Recreation will make every effort to provide for the safety and wellbeing of guests and animals; however, the management assumes no responsibility in case of injury, illness of death to the exhibits, Exhibitors or general public.

MARKET ANIMAL AUCTION



Market Animal Auction – Saturday, March 9, 2024 | 2 p.m.

- Lee County Parks & Recreation make no guarantee for the price paid for market animals. Each Exhibitor is responsible for finding a buyer.
- Exhibitors may only sell one market animal per show.
- The Sale is open to the public and all animals are sold to the highest bidder. Each buyer must complete a buyers form to be eligible to purchase a market animal. Multi-buyers are permitted with forms completed. Buyer's must pay on the day of the sale. Payments can be made via check, cash or credit card.
- Add-On's must be a Registered Buyer and have a Buyer's Number. All add-ons must be paid no later than the end of sale day. If not paid by the end of the sale day, along with the completed form, the Contributor will pay the funds directly to the Exhibitor(s).
- All market steer and market swine must be sold and sent to designated processor. There is no live animal pick-up.
- Buyer's must pay on the day of the sale. Payments can be made via check, cash or credit card. A 3% commission will be retained from all sales and does not apply to add-on's. A \$100 cap will be established on all sales.

All market animals must be processed for meat by designated processor following the sales.

There are no exceptions to this rule.

MARKET STEER RULES



- 1. All entries and awards are subject to the Registration Guidelines.
- 2. Steer must be owned by the Exhibitor by the first weigh-in date. The Livestock Owner's Certificate is required at first weigh-in. Steers being entered for competition must be 24 months old or less; age verification may be requested. Exhibitor photo and tail hair sample will be collected at first Steer Weigh In.
- 3. Steer do not have a minimum weight at the first weigh-in but must gain a minimum of 2 pounds per day for the feeding period and weigh a minimum of 1000 pounds at the final weigh-in. Any animal will be re-weighed if it is within 10 pounds of the required weight. There are 164 feeding days from first weigh-in to final weigh-in.
- 4. Prior to weigh-in, steer must be wearing a halter and be able to be led to scale. No breaking halters will be permitted. Each animal must have no more than one (1) rope attached during screening and/or show. Steer horns may be no longer than 2". Dehorned steers must be completed healed.
- 5. Steer will be screened for disposition and Exhibitor's ability to manage their animal. Each Exhibitor must be able to demonstrate they can lead, handle and present their animal for show in the setting/area that the Steer Barn Leads designate. An Exhibitor will be given no more than three (3) opportunities to pass the screening process during the scheduled screening times. If an Exhibitor is not able to manage his/her animal, the steer must be removed from the grounds and will be ineligible to show.
- 6. Exhibitors are required to bring three (3) buyer's letters to their first weigh-in. Buyer's Letters are intended to invite potential buyers to the Steer Show & Livestock Sale. Letters may be deemed unacceptable due to content, spelling, poor grammar or messiness. In these cases, the Exhibitor will be notified of the rejected letter(s) and will be responsible to produce replacement letter(s). Letters should be in pre-addressed envelopes with proper postage.
- 7. It is the responsibility of the Exhibitor and/or parent to notify the Livestock Office when an ear tag has come out or is lost. This can be done via email at Livestock@leegov.com. In this case, the steer will be retagged at final weigh-in / check-in.
- 8. If the RFID tag is lost, it is the Exhibitor's responsibility to get a replacement tag from the breeder.
- 9. Exhibitors must present a current health certificate at the final weigh-in from a veterinarian; it cannot be dated more than 90 days prior to the show.
- 10. Lee County Parks & Recreation reserves the right to disqualify animal entry due to poor disposition (i.e. external parasites, lameness, sunburn, open wounds), poor handling ability or quality.
- 11. Exhibitors are responsible for bringing their own grooming supplies, feed supplies and cleaning supplies to the grounds for personal use (this includes wheelbarrow, fork, water/feed buckets, etc). Professional groomers will not be permitted. Exhibitors may set up their equipment only after final weigh-in, as directed by the Barn Lead. Show boxes are permitted for Steer Exhibitors. Tents are limited to one (1) each, must be provided by the Exhibitor and may be no more than 12' x 12'.
- 12. Each Exhibitor must sign in and out at feeding/cleaning times.
- 13. Steer Exhibitors are encouraged to attend at least one (1) Prospect Show prior to January 15, 2024 and submit proof of attendance as outlined in Registration Guidelines.

MARKET STEER BARN RULES & INFORMATION



GENERAL BARN RULES

- No eating or drinking in the barn.
- Exhibitors must wear closed-toed shoes only (no Crocs) while in the barn. Appropriate attire is required (no tank tops, exposed midriffs, etc. Shorts must be an appropriate length).
- There will be no climbing or running in the barn; no horseplay of any kind is allowed.
- Inappropriate conduct by an Exhibitor, parent, leader, spectator or volunteer during the show will be grounds for immediate disqualification and/or ejection. This includes, but is not limited to, disruptive behavior, poor sportsmanship, inappropriate language, bullying and aggressive confrontations.
- Lead rope, neck rope, and halter are required for each animal. Exhibitors must tie with enough rope for the animal to lay down, but not too much to get caught in. Breaking halters are prohibited.

FEEDING BARN RULES AND INFORMATION

Wednesday, March 6 4 - 6 p.m.

Thursday, March 7 6 - 8 a.m. and Evening Feeding during Show Prep

Friday, March 8 6 - 8 a.m. and 4 - 5 p.m.

Saturday, March 9 7 - 9 a.m. and Evening Feeding during Sale

- Steers are to be back in the barn at the end of the feeding / cleaning time frame.
- Stall area and barn aisle must be cleaned daily during morning and evening feedings.
- Exhibitors are to be present to feed at least one time per day. A parent/guardian can feed one time a day (if needed).
- Spilled feed must be scooped up and placed in disposal bunk. Do not put trash in disposal bunk.
- Exhibitors are responsible for their own cleaning tools (rakes and shovels).
- Upon completion of feeding, hose down the feed area.
- Exhibitors must tie steer to a post, not the wire.
- Hoses are to be hung over the top board.
- Hay nets are not permitted. Hay must be placed on the ground in front of the steer.

SHOW DAY: Thursday, March 7 at 6 p.m.

- Grooming time will be posted during morning feeding on the Barn Board. Classes will be posted in the afternoon.
- Grooming must be done by Exhibitors only. Exhibitors may assist each other in grooming steer.
- Exhibitors must be dressed and at their pen with their steer ready by 5:45 p.m. Exhibitors will enter the show ring holding area (no animal) at 5:55 p.m. for show pledges, photos, etc.

GROOMING SHOW (Optional): Friday, March 8 at 5 p.m.

- Grooming Show is optional; Exhibitors must sign up to participate (during Exhibitor Meeting on March 6 at 6 p.m.)
- Exhibitors will get Steer off the wash rack, to the grooming chute and groom their own animal.
- Junior Exhibitors may have one parent/guardian assist in getting their Steer from the wash rack to the grooming chute.
- Exhibitors must have all supplies needed for the show prior to starting (chute, blower, products, etc).

MARKET STEER BARN RULES & INFORMATION



SALE DAY: Saturday, March 9 at 2 p.m.

- Following the morning feeding, all Steer Exhibitors are expected to set up chairs, etc. for the sale.
- Exhibitors must be dressed and in front of their Steer by 1 p.m.
- At 1:45 p.m. (or when the barn is closed), Exhibitors will be able to blow the steer out.

MANDATORY WORKDAY / CLEAN UP: Sunday, March 10 at 9 a.m.

- Barn opens to Exhibitors at 9 a.m.; Exhibitors must sign in with Barn Lead.
- Stall cards must not be removed until the stall and feed area are cleaned. All items in the barn, secure area, and show ring need to be clean and inspected by Barn Volunteers.
- All areas (barn, bleachers, show ring) must be cleaned of all trash and debris.
- No Exhibitors will sign out and leave until dismissed by the Barn Lead.

STEER SHOWMANSHIP AND GROOMING RULES

- 1. All entries and awards are subject to the Registration Guidelines.
- 2. Sign-ups for the Showmanship and Grooming will be taken via the Showman App at the time of registration.
- 3. The Exhibitor is the only person able to show his/her animal.
- 4. The Showmanship contest will be judged on the following basis:
 - a. The ability of the Exhibitor to lead, pose, and generally handle his/her animal.
 - b. The Exhibitor's attention to the ring stewards and the contest judge.
 - c. The Exhibitor's knowledge of proper handling procedures in the show ring demonstrated by his/her actions.
 - d. Other areas as deemed necessary by the contest judge to determine the winners.
- 5. Exhibitors are required to groom their own animal. Failure to comply will result in disqualification from the grooming competition.
- 6. Use of electric clippers on Steer is prohibited during the show. Major clippings must be done prior to arrival on the grounds.

MARKET SWINE RULES



- 1. All entries and awards are subject to the Registration Guidelines.
- 2. Swine must be of a recognized domestic breed; no wild or potbellied breeds permitted.
- 3. Swine must be a barrow or gilt for market show/sale.
- 4. Swine will be ear-tagged by Livestock Volunteers on Sunday, October 22, 2023 at the Lee County Civic Center Complex. All animals must be inside the gate by 10 a.m. Swine must be owned by the Exhibitor on or before the tagging date and have the RFID tag from breeder for entry at show. Exhibitor photos will be taken to verify ear tag matching the animal. Owner's certificate must be submitted at ear tagging, along with signed photo release and three (3) prepared buyer's letters.
- a. Buyer's Letters are intended to invite potential buyers to the Swine Show & Livestock Sale. Letters may be deemed unacceptable due to content, spelling, poor grammar or messiness. In these cases, the Exhibitor will be notified of the rejected letter(s) and will be responsible to produce replacement letter(s). Letters should be in pre-addressed envelopes with proper postage.
- 5. Swine must weigh a minimum of 240 pounds at check-in. There is no top weight, however the maximum sale weight will be 325 pounds (135 feeding days from initial tag-in to final weigh-in).
- 6. It is the responsibility of the Exhibitor and/or parent to notify the Livestock Office when an ear tag has come out or is lost. This can be done via email at Livestock@leegov.com. In this case, the swine will be retagged at final weigh-in / check-in.
- 7. If the RFID tag is lost, it is the Exhibitor's responsibility to get a replacement tag from the breeder.
- 8. Exhibitors must present a current health certificate at the final weigh-in from a veterinarian; cannot be dated more than 90 days prior to the show.
- 9. Lee County Parks & Recreation reserves the right to disqualify animal entry due to poor disposition (i.e. external parasites, lameness, sunburn, open wounds), poor handling ability or quality.
- 10. All grooming of swine must be completed prior to arrival at grounds, besides washing. Slick clipping or body shaving of market swine is prohibited except on ears and tail. Slick clipping or body shaving means having hair that is less than one half inch in length on the body of the swine. Violation of this rule can disqualify the Exhibitor from showing their market swine.
- 11. Exhibitors are responsible for bringing their own grooming supplies, feed supplies and cleaning supplies to the grounds for personal use. Professional groomers will not be permitted.
- 12. Each Exhibitor must sign in and out daily at feeding/cleaning times.

MARKET SWINE BARN RULES & INFORMATION



GENERAL BARN RULES

- Parents/guardians and/or siblings are not permitted in the barn during feeding times.
- No eating or drinking in the barn.
- Exhibitors must wear closed-toed shoes only (no Crocs) while in the barn. Appropriate attire is required (no tank tops, exposed midriffs, etc. Shorts must be an appropriate length).
- There will be no climbing or running in the barn; no horseplay of any kind is allowed.
- All swine will remain in their pen after 6 p.m.
- Inappropriate conduct by an Exhibitor, parent, leader, spectator or volunteer during the show will be grounds for immediate disqualification and/or ejection. This includes, but is not limited to, disruptive behavior, poor sportsmanship, inappropriate language, bullying and aggressive confrontations.

FEEDING/CLEANING/CHECKOUT

- All evening feedings and clean-up will be from 4-6 p.m.
- · Barn Lead will feed in the MORNING hours on Thursday, March 7 and Friday, March 8 only.
- Exhibitors will be required to bring a FULL FEEDING for animals in a ziplock bag with their pen number and name for the Thursday & Friday morning feedings.
- Pens must be cleaned daily and be inspected by a Barn Lead before signing out. Animal waste must go in the designated area between the Swine Barn and Tinsley Pavilion.
- Exhibitors are responsible for their own cleaning tools (rakes and shovels).
- Upon completion of feeding, cleaning and pen check, Exhibitors must wash the feed bowl and return it to the window to sign out (Tuesday-Friday with feed bag).

SHOW DAY: Wednesday, March 6 at 6 p.m. / Sale Day – Saturday, March 9 at 2 p.m.

- Wash time is 7-10 a.m. on both Show and Sale Day. All swine must be in their pen by 11 a.m.
- Exhibitors must be dressed and at their pen one (1) hour prior to start time.
- Exhibitors, volunteers and buyers only are allowed in the barn one (1) hour prior to the start time of the sale.
- Exhibitors placing in 1st or 2nd in their class must remain with their animal to return to the show ring when instructed.
- All Exhibitors must clean the show ring and bleacher area prior to entering the barn to feed and sign out for the evening. The Swine Barn will not open until this area is cleaned and inspected by Barn Lead(s).

MANDATORY CLEAN UP: Sunday, March 10 at 10 a.m.

- Barn opens to Exhibitors at 10 a.m.; Exhibitors must be signed in no later than 10:15 a.m.
- All pens (including holding pens) must be cleaned of all waste and wet sand.
- Wash racks must be cleaned and all hoses disconnected.
- Aisle ways need to the cleaned and leveled.
- All feed bowls must be cleaned and turned in at final sign-out.
- · All areas (barn, bleachers, show ring) must be cleaned of all trash and debris.
- No Exhibitors will sign out until the above is complete and a Barn Volunteers inspects the pen area.

MARKET SWINE MUST COMPLY WITH FEDERAL REGULATION 9CFR.71.19.

This requires that all swine being shown at fairs or exhibitions must have official individual identification. Swine presented that do not meet the federal requirements may not be allowed entrance into the show.

BEEF BREEDING RULES



- 1. All entries and awards are subject to the Registration Guidelines.
- 2. Exhibitors may show no more than one animal per class (a 75lb weight difference is recommended). The same animal may not be shown by more than one person unless show warrants. There is a limit of four (4) animals per Exhibitor in Beef Breeding. There must be at least three (3) animals (i.e. Bulls) to constitute a Class.
- 3. Beef cattle may be purebred, grade or cross bred. The show will consist of every animal except dairy.
- 4. Prior to weigh-in, each animal must be wearing a halter and be able to be led to scale. No breaking halters permitted. Each animal must have no more than one (1) rope attached during screening and/or show.
- 5. Exhibitors are responsible for completing all grooming but may enlist the 'hands on help' from other Exhibitors. Professional groomers will not be permitted. Exhibitors must bring their own grooming supplies, feed supplies and cleaning supplies to the grounds for personal use (this includes wheelbarrow, fork, water/feed buckets, etc). Exhibitors may set up their equipment only after final weigh-in, as directed by the Barn Lead. Show boxes are permitted for Beef Breeding Exhibitors. Tents are limited to one (1) each, must be provided by the Exhibitor and may be no more than 12' x 12'.
- 6. Horns can be no longer than 2".
- 7. All bulls must have a nose ring.
- 8. A mandatory score of 6 or better is required for Health / Body Conditioning Screening. Animals will be screened for disposition and Exhibitor's ability to manage their animal. Each Exhibitor must be able to demonstrate they can lead their cattle animals with a show halter and one lead rope. An Exhibitor will be given no more than three (3) opportunities to pass the screening process during the scheduled screening times. If an Exhibitor is not able to manage his/her animal, the steer must be removed from the grounds and will be ineligible to show.

BEEF BREEDING BARN RULES



GENERAL BARN RULES:

- No eating or drinking in the barn.
- Exhibitors must wear closed-toed shoes only (no Crocs) while in the barn. Appropriate attire is required (no tank tops, exposed midriffs, etc. Shorts must be an appropriate length).
- There will be no climbing or running in the barn; no horseplay of any kind is allowed.
- Inappropriate conduct by an Exhibitor, parent, leader, spectator or volunteer during the show will be grounds for immediate disqualification and/or ejection. This includes, but is not limited to, disruptive behavior, poor sportsmanship, inappropriate language, bullying and aggressive confrontations.
- Lead rope and neck rope are required for each animal. Exhibitors should tie with enough rope for the animal to lay down, but not too much to get caught in.

FEEDING AND STALL CLEANING:

Thursday, February 29 4 - 6 p.m.

Friday, March 1 6 - 8 a.m. and 4-6 p.m.

Saturday, March 2 7 - 9 a.m. and Evening Feeding during Show Prep

Sunday, March 3 8 - 9 a.m. / Release Day (see below)

- Animals are to be back in the barn at the end of the feeding / cleaning time frame.
- Stall area and barn aisle must be cleaned daily during morning and evening feedings.
- Exhibitors are to be present to feed one time per day. A parent/guardian can feed one time a day (if needed).
- Spilled feed must be scooped up and placed in disposal bunk. No trash in disposal bunk.
- Exhibitors are responsible for their own cleaning tools (rakes and shovels).
- Upon completion of feeding, hose down the feed area.
- Exhibitors must tie steer to a post, not the wire.
- Hoses are to be hung over the top board.
- Hay nets are not permitted. Hay must be placed on the ground in front of the steer.
- Grooming and washing may be done during regular feed times and as posted in barn.

SHOW DAY: Saturday, March 2 at 6 p.m.

- Grooming time will be posted during morning feeding on the Barn Board. Classes will be posted in the afternoon.
- Grooming must be done by Exhibitors only. Exhibitors may assist each other in grooming cattle.
- Exhibitors must be dressed and have animal(s) ready by 5:45 p.m. Exhibitors will enter the show ring holding area (no animal) at 5:55 p.m. for show pledges, photos, etc.

MANDATORY WORKDAY / CLEAN UP: Sunday, March 3 at 8 a.m.

- Barn opens to Exhibitors at 8 a.m.; Exhibitors must sign in with Barn Lead.
- Stall cards must not be removed until the stall and feed area are cleaned. All Exhibitors will assist in cleaning the aisles, secure grounds, and wash racks.
- No Exhibitors will sign out and leave until dismissed by the Barn Lead.

HORSE RULES



- 1. All entries and awards are subject to the Registration Guidelines.
- 2. All entries for Speed and Performance Shows must be included when registering online. There are no additional registration fees for competitions or shows. Walk-trot classes are for non-cantering riders only. Walk-trot riders cannot ride in any other classes other than Walk-trot.
- 3. Horses must have a current Coggins certificate (within 1 year) and a Health Certificate dated within 10 days of entering the grounds.
- 4. Approved safety helmets are required in all events, including halter, showmanship, and in-hand classes. Helmets must be worn at all times when in the arena and/or mounted.
- 5. Horses competing are restricted to those owned by the Exhibitor or leased by the owner of the horse.
- 6. All horses must be in place at the close of check-in and will remain in place until officially released. No horse(s) will be permitted to be brought in for a specific event.
- 7. The Horse Barn Lead will assign all stalls and shall be able to move or rearrange exhibits if it is deemed necessary.
- 8. Horse stalls must show the name of the Exhibitor, breed, age, and sex of the horse. The horse registered is the only horse to be shown. "For Sale" signs are not permitted.
- 9. Horses are not permitted to be ridden on the Midway, on the paved area around the food concessions or in the barns. Any exercising and lungeing of horses is to be done in the outdoor horse arena with the gates closed. Horses are not permitted to be turned out into the arena and left unattended at any time. Exhibitors may only ride on the grounds when a Barn Lead is present.
- 10. Lee County Parks & Recreation reserves the right to disqualify animal entry due to poor disposition (i.e. external parasites, lameness, sunburn, open wounds), poor handling ability or quality.
- 11. Horses that are known to kick or rear must have a bright color ribbon attached to their tail at ALL times while on the premises.
- 12. Under no circumstances, should a horse be twitched while on the property, unless the twitch is performed by a certified veterinarian with proper approval.
- 13. Shank bits are prohibited. Exhibitors that are found using shank bits will be disqualified from the show.

HORSE RULES



- 14. Exhibitors are responsible for bringing their own grooming supplies, feed supplies, cleaning supplies, and tack to the grounds for personal use. Professional groomers will not be permitted.
 - a. It is recommended, but not required, that Exhibitors label all their belongings with their first and last name.
 - b. Bedding will be provided at check-in, with refresher bedding supplied mid-week. Exhibitor may supply additional bedding at their own expense.
 - c. Feed and water buckets must be secured to the stalls. No buckets are to be left on the stall floor. Exhibitor should bring two (2) water buckets and one (1) feed bucket.
 - d. Horses will be washed at the racks located on the North side of the Horse Barn. Major grooming and clipping should be done prior to the check-in.
 - Lee County Parks & Recreation is not responsible for any lost, stolen, or damaged belongings brought to the fair. Any items brought to the fair are the sole responsibility of the Exhibitor.

HORSE BARN RULES



GENERAL BARN RULES:

- Exhibitors are required to keep their stalls in clean and sanitary condition. All stalls and aisles are to be cleaned daily.
- It is mandatory that a halter and a lead rope, in good condition, be left at the horse's stall.
- Stall guards are prohibited. Stall doors must be secured when horse is stalled.
- No eating or drinking in the barn.
- Exhibitors must wear closed-toed shoes only (no Crocs) while in the barn. Appropriate attire is required (no tank tops, exposed midriffs, etc. Shorts must be an appropriate length).
- There will be no climbing or running in the barn; no horseplay of any kind is allowed.
- Exhibitors are not permitted to ride horses in any other location besides the arena and a Barn Lead must be present.
- Inappropriate conduct by an Exhibitor, parent, leader, spectator, or volunteer during the show will be grounds for immediate disqualification and/or ejection. This includes, but is not limited to, disruptive behavior, poor sportsmanship, inappropriate language, bullying and aggressive confrontations.
- Exhibitors are expected to maintain safety precautions for duration of show. Stall doors should remain closed at all times unless horse is being pulled out, being put up or if stall is being cleaned. If the horse is in the stall while it is being cleaned, the door must remain closed. Stall doors must remain closed when the barn is open to the public.

TACK STALLS

- Each Exhibitor is permitted one (1) stall to store their tack, feeding supplies, cleaning supplies, and show gear.
- If one (1) Exhibitor is participating in both the speed and performance shows, they can use the same tack stall for the duration of the fair. If an Exhibitor is only participating in the performance show, their tack stall must be cleaned out during the checkout process for their Exhibit animal.

FEEDING AND STALL CLEANING:

- Feeding and cleaning times are 6 9 a.m. and 4 6 p.m.
- Each Exhibitor must sign in and out daily at feeding/cleaning times. Parent/guardian may feed in the morning during the week. Exhibitors must feed morning and night on weekends.
- Hay bags must be hung up high enough so horses cannot get their feet stuck in it.
- Exhibitors are responsible for the care of their horses and the cleaning of their stalls daily. Junior Exhibitors may have help from a parent/guardian or another Exhibitor.
- Animal waste must be dumped in the designated area and nowhere else. Exhibitors are responsible for raking in front of their stalls.
- Exhibitors are responsible for their own cleaning tools.
- At the end of the show(s), the stalls must be cleaned and inspected by the Barn Lead. Other cleaning in barn may be required before any Exhibitor is released. Specific instructions will be provided upon final check-out.

GOLDEN SHOVEL AWARD FOR EXHIBITION CARE AND MANAGEMENT

Animal pens will be judged on cleanliness of pen or stall, condition of water and feed buckets, and condition of animal (grooming, manure stains, etc). Feeding must be done in a timely manner in accordance with the scheduled feeding times. Failure to complete daily feeding duties within the allotted time will result in forfeit of points for that day. It also includes giving the animal adequate daily exercise. Exhibitors are expected to take full responsibility of the care of their animal and stall. Junior Exhibitors can enlist some 'hands on help' of others Exhibitors, parents/guardians or 4-H / FFA leaders, if necessary. Senior Exhibitors are expected to be responsible for all aspects of their animal's care. Failure to comply will result in the disqualification from the Golden Shovel Award competition.



ALL-AROUND HORSEMAN AWARD RULES (All Exhibitors must participate)

The All-Around Horsemen Award competition is a supplement to the current animal show ring premiums, and rewards exhibitors based on their participation in a wide variety of educational events. Points accrue in the areas of Demonstration, Project Book, etc.

Each event will count for 100 points. Scores will be calculated as a percentage of points available (example: if score was 27/30, points would be 27/30 = 90%, so 90 points would be given). Maximum points will equal 600 with bonus points awarded where indicated. The following events are required and will be included:

Exhibitors must create and turn in an educational poster for judging. Posters must be on display by 9 a.m. on the Friday after check-in. Posters must be done on a 20" x 30" foam board. The purpose of the poster is to help educate the public about the horse project. The required information is as follows and must be clearly visible on the front of the poster:

- Exhibitor Name, Age and Club/Chapter Name
- · Horse's Name, Age and Breed
- Optional Information: pictures, poems, ribbons or other articles.

All items must be within the poster edges. The poster will be on display during the show in the project animal area. Judging will be based on the following:

- Topics & Educational Value (10 points)
- Originality & Creativity (10 points)

Posters must be removed during the scheduled release time. Posters, where it is apparent that the work was done by parents or others, will not be judged. Upon acceptance, all posters will be dated and initialed by the Barn Lead or designee. Posters must be the work of the Exhibitor.

In general, the contest will be judged on the following basis: The ability of the contestant to lead, pose, and generally handle his/her animal or other contestant's if indicated by the contest judge; the contestant's attention to the ring stewards and the contest judge; the contestant's knowledge of proper handling procedures in the show ring and demonstrated by his/her actions; other areas as deemed necessary by the contest judge to determine the winners. A contestant can only show his/her animal.

SMALL ANIMAL RULES



- 1. All entries and awards are subject to the Registration Guidelines.
- 2. Carrying cases are prohibited from being left on the grounds.
- 3. All entries must be in at the specified Check-In time.
- 4. All Exhibitors in the Showmanship competition (fur or feather) must be present to show their registered animal. Sign-up will take place via the Showman App at the time of registration.
- 5. All entries must be owned by or the property of the Exhibitor by November 10, 2023.
- 6. The Livestock Owner's Certificate and proper identification Exhibitor tag is required for each animal at checkin.
- 7. All signs must be approved by the Barn Lead.
- 8. Cages must be maintained in a clean and sanitary condition at all times.
- 9. No toys are permitted in any cage. Cavies will be allowed housing. If utilizing hay, only pelleted or cubed form is permitted.
- 10. All Exhibitors must be able to care for and show their animal without the help of a parent/guardian. Assistance may be provided by another Exhibitor and/or Barn Lead.
- 11. Lee County Parks & Recreation reserves the right to disqualify animal entries due to poor disposition (i.e. external parasites, lameness, sunburn, open wounds), poor handling ability or quality.
- 12. Each Exhibitor must sign in and out daily at feeding/cleaning times.
- 13. PeeWee and Cloverbud Exhibitors must pick up any awards by the end of the show.

SMALL ANIMAL BARN RULES



GENERAL BARN RULES:

- No eating or drinking in the barn.
- Exhibitors must wear closed-toed shoes only (no Crocs) while in the barn. Appropriate attire is required (no tank tops, exposed midriffs, etc. Shorts must be an appropriate length).
- There will be no climbing or running in the barn; no horseplay of any kind is allowed.
- Inappropriate conduct by an Exhibitor, parent, leader, spectator or volunteer during the show will be grounds for immediate disqualification and/or ejection. This includes, but is not limited to, disruptive behavior, poor sportsmanship, inappropriate language, bullying and aggressive confrontations.
- Exhibitors are permitted to care for their animal only. Assistance may be provided by another Exhibitor and/or Barn Lead. Parents/Guardians are not permitted in the barns at feeding time.
- 'Ask Me Booth' participation is mandatory for all Small Animal Exhibitors.
- Cages must be zip tied to secure gates each evening. Exhibitors are responsible for bringing their own zip ties to secure feeders and waterers.
- Storage area for food and supplies is not provided; Exhibitors are responsible for bringing food and cleaning supplies daily. Exhibitors should label any items being brought to the grounds.

FEEDING AND STALL CLEANING

Daily Feeding Times 4 - 5:30 p.m.

- Exhibitors must sign in and sign out at feeding times daily with the Barn Lead. Cages will be checked by Barn Lead prior to sign out.
- Cleaning supplies must be brought daily. This includes, but is not limited to, litter scoop and small bucket to
 clean under cages and cage wire. Cages must always be clean and sanitary. Waste is to be disposed in the
 designated areas only.
- No toys, bedding or hay mats will be allowed in cages.
- Cage mats are not allowed in the bottom of feather cages.
- Plastic rest mats and cage resting mats are permitted (FUR ONLY). These items must be washed daily.

CHECK-OUT

- Animals may leave during designated check-out times only. Animals are not permitted to be removed without going through the check-out process.
- Auction animals must continue to be fed and have pen cleaned daily by the Exhibitor until they are released to the buyer.
- Clean up from auction animal cages will be completed on Saturday during regular cleaning / feeding hours.
- All auction Exhibitors are required to attend and participate in the final barn clean up on Sunday, March 10.
 All Fur Exhibitors are expected to sign-in for the final clean-up.

- 2. All Goats must be fully owned by their Exhibitor by Sunday, December 3, 2023.
- 3. All Goat Exhibitors must participate in the pre-fair Health & Conditioning screening on Sunday, December 3, 2023.
- 4. At the Health & Conditioning screening, and at show check-in, health papers (OCVI), Premise ID and proof of ownership (Livestock Owner's Certificate) will be checked.
- 5. Exhibitors may show no more than 1 Goat per class.
- 6. No buck goats permitted to be shown or are allowed in the barn, with the exception of being on a Doe AND under 2 months of age.
- 7. There will be no pre-show milk out. Over-uddering of milkers will result in disqualification of the Exhibitor and the goat(s).
- 8. Milk must be disposed of in designated locations only. See Barn Lead for milk disposal instructions.
- 9. No pinch, spiked, pronged or training collars are allowed.
- 10. Check-in will be on Thursday, February 29 from 12 2 p.m. Exhibitors are required to be present.
- 11. Goat Exhibitors must bring the following to the check-in table:

GENERAL BARN RULES

- Exhibitors are required to keep their stalls in clean and sanitary condition. All stalls and aisles are to be cleaned daily.
- No eating or drinking in the barn.
- Exhibitors must wear closed-toed shoes only (no Crocs) while in the barn. Appropriate attire is required (no tank tops, exposed midriffs, etc. Shorts must be an appropriate length).
- There will be no climbing or running in the barn; no horseplay of any kind is allowed.
- Inappropriate conduct by an Exhibitor, parent, leader, spectator or volunteer during the show will be grounds for immediate disqualification and/or ejection. This includes, but is not limited to, disruptive behavior, poor sportsmanship, inappropriate language, bullying and aggressive confrontations.

FEEDING AND STALL CLEANING

Thursday, February 29 4 - 6 p.m.

Friday, March 1 8 - 9 a.m. and 4 - 5:45 p.m. Saturday, March 2 8 - 9 a.m. and 4 - 5:45 p.m. Sunday, March 3 8 - 9 a.m. and 4 - 5:45 p.m.

- Each Exhibitor must sign in and out daily at feeding/cleaning times.
- Only Exhibitors are permitted inside the barn during daily feeding / cleaning.
- Exhibitors must supply water buckets, feed pans and hay bags / buckets.
- Barn Leads will feed for Exhibitors on Friday morning only. Feed must be provided in a ziplock bag with the
 Exhibitor's name and pen number printed clearly. Feed and watering bowl must be turned into a Barn Lead
 before leaving on Thursday night.
- Exhibitors are responsible for the care, feeding and daily exercise of their goat. See Barn Lead for designated exercise area. Exhibitors are not permitted to care for one another's goats.
- Exhibitors will be provided with a storage pen and are responsible for keeping their tack and supplies within their assigned area. Hay needs to be stored in a lawn bag, hay bag or storage bin to prevent loss of hay on ground.
- Goats may be tied off in designated area during cleaning / feeding times. Goats are not permitted to run free in barn or show ring.
- PeeWee Exhibitors may receive verbal and 'hands on help' from experienced Exhibitors. No parents are allowed in the barns during feeding times. PeeWees must be able to independently care for their goat.
- Exhibitors are responsible for furnishing their own netting, ties or tarps to secure goat kids.
- Animal waste must be dumped in the designated area and nowhere else.
- If an Exhibitor would like to request shavings, it must be done no later than the December 3 Health Screening. All Exhibitors that request shavings will be penned in the same aisle to minimize cleanup. There will be no changes regarding shaving after show check-in.
- Grooming tents or easy ups will not be allowed. There will be a designated space for stands.
- At the end of the show(s), the stalls must be cleaned and inspected by the Barn Lead. Other cleaning in barn may be required before any Exhibitor is released. Specific instructions will be provided upon final check-out.



SHOW DAY: Sunday, March 3 at 11:30 a.m.

- All entries and awards are subject to the Registration Guidelines.
- All animals must come to check-in washed, groomed and ready for show. No bathing or clipping will be allowed in the barn.
- Classes will be posted on the afternoon of show day.
- Exhibitors are expected to be in proper show attire and ready 30 minutes before show time. The barn will be limited to Exhibitors ONLY during this time.
- Exhibitors will enter the show ring 15 minutes prior to show for pledges, photos, etc. (no animal).

CHECK OUT: Monday, March 4 at 7:30 a.m.

- Goats will be released on Monday, March 4. All Exhibitors must be signed in by 7:30 a.m.
- Each Exhibitor is responsible for the cleaning of their pens and the area surrounding their pens.
- No Exhibitor will be released until their area is inspected the barn has been signed off by the Barn Lead.

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

All goats / sheep consigned for public exhibition in Florida must be accompanied by an official certificate of veterinary inspection certifying the animals to be free from symptoms of contagious or infectious disease, and registered in the National Scrapie Eradication Program. All goats registered for the Southwest Florida Ag Expo must comply with FDACS Rules and Regulations as stated in: FAC 5C-4.005, 5C-4.0017, 9CFR, Part 79-2.

For registered purebred goats identified with an official breed registration certificate showing registration number, official permanent ID, tattoo's or electronic ID (microchip), official ear tags are not required. However, upon presentation of such animal for exhibition, a copy of the breed registration certificate must accompany each animal. Regardless of the method of official identification, each animal must be associated with a Premise ID number.



ALL AROUND HERDSMAN AWARD

Points accrue in the following areas: Demonstration, 'Ask Me Booth', Educational Poster, Exhibit Care and Management, Showmanship, Entry Points and Pre-Fair Educational Events. Failure to comply in any of these areas will disqualify the Exhibitor from the All-Around Herdsman Award.

Each event will count for 100 points. Score will be calculated as a percentage of points available (i.e. if score was 27-30 points, points would be 27/30 = 90%; 90 points would be given). Maximum points will equal 660. The following events will be included:

Entry Points (complete, timely, submitted by deadline)	100 points
2. 'Ask Me Booth' (participation)	100 points
3. Demonstration	100 points
4. Educational Poster (percentage out of 30 points)	100 points
5. Exhibit Care and Management (percentage by # of days at the fair)	100 points

DEMONSTRATION

Exhibitors are required to give a Pre-Event Talk or Demonstration. This must be in the area of the project animal and be in conjunction with the project animal record book. Exhibitors must submit a script from the talk, a grade sheet from the demonstration or a letter from the 4-H or FFA leader, and will be submitted at the animal checkin. A Demonstration is required in order to qualify for the All-Around Herdsman.



GOAT EDUCATIONAL POSTER (mandatory)

Exhibitors must create and turn in an educational poster for judging. Posters must be turned in during animal check-in. Posters must be done on a 20" x 30" foam board. The purpose of the poster is to help educate the public about goats. All items must be within the poster edges. The poster will be on display during the show in the project animal area. The required information is as follows and must be clearly visible on the bottom-right corner of the poster:

- Exhibitor Name
- Division
- Club / Chapter Name

Judging will be based on the following:

- Topics & Educational Value (10 points)
- Originality & Creativity (10 points)
- Quality of Work (10 points)

Posters must be removed during the scheduled release time. Posters, where it is apparent that the work was done by parents or others, will not be judged. Upon acceptance, all posters will be dated and initialed by the Barn Lead or designee. Posters must be the work of the Exhibitor.

EXHIBITION CARE AND MANAGEMENT

Animal pens will be judged on cleanliness of pen or stall, condition of water and feed buckets, and condition of animal (grooming, manicure stains, etc.). A maximum of 10 points divided by days exhibited will be awarded. Feeding must be done in a timely manner in accordance with the scheduled feeding times. This also includes giving the animal adequate daily exercise. Exhibitors are expected to take full responsibility of the care of their animal and pen. PeeWee Exhibitors may enlist 'hands on help' of other Exhibitors if necessary. Parents are prohibited from being in the barn during feeding time. Failure to comply will result in the disqualification from the All-Around Herdsman Award.



GOAT AGILITY CONTEST RULES: Thursday, February 29 at 6 p.m. (Optional)

This event is open to all registered goat project Exhibitors, and the goat must already be on the fairgrounds. Safety for the Exhibitor and the goat comes first. There will be a "Safety Assistant" at each obstacle on the course. They are there to help the Exhibitors and are the only persons that will be giving direction while running the course. This is a fun and optional event and will not accrue points towards All-Around Herdsman.

GUIDELINES

- A good relationship between the Exhibitor and their goat is important. This includes the ability to control the goat when walking on a lead.
- Exhibitors and their goat must have some sort of agility experience to participate in this contest.
- The Exhibitor must maintain reasonable control over their goat at all times. Goats must remain on a lead during their time on the agility course.
- Each Exhibitor may only run the course one time and each Exhibitor must use their own goat.

STANDARD EQUIPMENT

- Exhibitors must wear boots and follow the dress code for Exhibitors.
- Goat must wear a collar and lead. The lead is for encouraging the goat to follow through the obstacles. Pulling on the goat is not recommended.
- Exhibitors may offer treats to encourage the goat.

TIMED EVENT

- 1st, 2nd, and 3rd Place winners will be chosen for each age division of PeeWee, Junior, Intermediate and Senior. The winners will be the Exhibitors who complete the course in the shortest amount of time, including penalties. An "Overall Agility Champion" will be chosen for all divisions.
- If there is a tie with times, the Exhibitors will run through the course again as a tiebreaker.
- There will be a 10-second penalty for each obstacle of the course that is not completed. This means that the goat's front feet must start each station and its back feet must finish it. If the goat comes off an obstacle, the Exhibitor must move to the next obstacle. Penalty points may occur.
